

Dear NJCDLP Board Members and Administrators,

Happy New Year!

We have several great projects in the works for this year. Here are a few highlights:

- This Thursday our affiliate, [Golden Badge](#), will be launching an initiative for law enforcement whistleblowers subjected to what they contend are retaliatory criminal prosecutions. We hope to establish a constitutional entitlement to a reasonably thorough government investigation unique to them. We do so in large part through a law review article that Andrew, Sandy, and I wrote that I'll be submitting for print publication, "[How To Get Away With Career Murder: The Unconstitutional Blueprint for Systematically Purging Whistleblowers from U.S. Law Enforcement](#)".
- On February 16, 2016, Opt IN USA will be issuing its State of the Union report. It will focus on the administration of justice in America and, more specifically, on the failure of judicial oversight in response to persistent U.S. legal system abuse facilitated by judicial misconduct. Shreya made this tremendously important human rights initiative possible by pioneering the thought that serial rights violations under color of law can constitute torture, even in the absence of physical aggression/violence.
- Jill, Judge DeAnn Salcido (ret.), and I are spearheading development of the DeAnn Salcido Center to address high conflict relationships compounded by U.S. legal system abuse. The DSC will be a clearinghouse of relevant data; a government training source; a professional services navigator; public policy/political activist; and would offer personal support, self-help training, and advocacy for service recipients. Some aspects of this program model will be adapted for other programs under the NJCDLP umbrella;
- Andrew and I are exploring the prospect of NJCDLP operating a flexible tuition-based pre-paralegal training program. It would offer a hybrid of training suitable for paralegals, community organizers, and information managers.

I'm continuing to work with Sandy and Michael to develop some Millennial-intriguing presentations via Drum Majors for Truth. Wish us luck!

By the way, Michael has developed a body of very compelling work on "How False Constructs Come to Be Regarded As Irrefutable Truth" and related topics. His writings help bring objectivity to so much of what we do through NJCDLP. They substantially reduce our risk of being dismissed as conspiracy theorists in proposing and addressing national patterns and practices of misconduct.

Finally, of course, our efforts continue to fund Theatre for Justice. I'm optimistic about our prospects.
